

Focus on the Readings

If we were playing the familiar TV quiz show, Family Feud, and the question was: "What is the most well known verse of the Bible?" the number one answer would be Psalm 23: "The Lord is my Shepherd." It is well known for the tenderness and the consolation that it offers. This fourth Sunday of Easter is sometimes known as "Good Shepherd Sunday" because of the text we hear from John's Gospel where Jesus proclaims: "I AM the Good Shepherd."

It reminds me some years ago nearly one hundred grade two children were preparing for reconciliation. In small groups they were each



asked to make a sheep! You can picture it: a paper roll body, with glued-on cotton balls, with pipe cleaner legs, and a head we provided. When they completed their sheep, they were all placed on large table, with a green cloth and small statue of the Good Shepherd. At the end of the day, as the children were dismissed, I directed them to pick up their sheep to take home. I had forgotten to ask them to put their names on their sheep. To my amazement, every child knew the particular sheep they had made!

What a lesson for all of the adults who were present there that day. "I know my sheep and mine know me." In this Easter season, let us reflect anew about our relationship with God and with our risen Christ.
